- 2 Causeway first opened 1843, second 1862, third 1952
- 3 Canning Bridge constructions 1849, 1867, 1908, 1939, 1995, 1999
- 4 Chinese Gardens from 1880s to 1952
- 5 South Perth/Kensington Park Racecourse from 1890s to 1913
- 6 Mends Street Jetty built 1894
- 7 Coode Street Jetty built 1896
- 8 Windsor Hotel opened 1898
- 9 Tea Gardens Hotel from 1898 to 1941
- 10 Perth Zoo opened 1898, mineral baths from 1911
- 11 South Perth State School opened 1898, upgrade 1958
- 12 Como Primary School founded 1916
- 13 Weaver and Lock cordial factory 1919, 1946, demolished 1990s
- 14 Trams connect Causeway to Zoo to Ednah Street 1922 until 1950
- 15 Wesley College founded 1923
- 16 Gaiety Picture Theatre from 1926 to 1961
- 17 Hurlingham Picture Gardens Open Air Theatre from 1933
- 18 FJ Roberts Dairy 1935
- 19 Fire/Ambulance Station from 1936 to 1973 then to 1987
- 20 Como Picture Theatre opened 1938, renamed Cygnet 1968
- 21 Como Hotel opened 1939
- 22 St Ann's/Methodist Ladies College 1940 to 1951
- 23 Noonan's South Perth Bakery 1940s
- 24 Narrows Bridge opened 1959, additions 2001 and 2005

Heirisson Island named 1801 after French midshipman Francois Antoine Boniface Heirisson on board the ship Le Naturaliste.

Sir James Mitchell (b1866, d1951) 13th Premier and Governor of Western Australia.

Rt. Hon. Sir Henry Du Pre Labouchere (b1831, d 1912) Parliamentary Under Secretary for the Colonies in 1839, Secretary of State for the Colonies 1855 - 1858. Also writer, publisher, and theatre owner.

George Canning (b1770 , d1827) British Primeminister for 4 months who died in office.

Henry Dundas, Viscount Melville (b1742, d1811) of Melville in the County of Edinburgh, First Lord of the Admiralty 1804-1806.

Sir John Coode (b1816 , d1892) distinguished British harbour engineer.

Karawara is an Aboriginal name meaning green. The suburb name was approved in 1973.
